And I can be thankful for the generally healthy state of the Community Association!

The success of the Community Association in organising an ever increasing and varied programme of events which attract growing numbers is in part due to the assurance that anyone with an idea for an event will have the cheerful backing of the events committee, which is currently headed by the sociable and competent Elizabeth Foster. With the funds raised by these events all the premises have been materially improved to some extent in recent years and have seen an increase in their use. Di Burnett, leader of the Youth Club, amazingly dedicates her Friday evenings to devising a variety of activities for the club members and deserves more support from their parents.

As to the matter of encouraging more of you to volunteer to serve on the Community Association Council, may I tempt you by saying that you would be welcomed by a loyal core of villagers. We have a full complement of honorary officers willing to serve for another year so there is no danger that you would be levered into a position you do not want.

So please attend our AGM on Tuesday 10th June, volunteer your ideas and support so that the Association might serve all of our community. *Vivienne Withall*

Vicar at St Johns, Ashley Green 1994 - 2000



THE HAPPIEST OF DAYS

On Sunday, 17th April 1994 the Rev Margaret Hall carried out her first full Communion Service at St John's Church in Ashley Green. The church was full: with friends from the village, from the Church in Chesham, and from further afield.

Margaret Had been ordained priest the day before by the Rt. Rev Simon Burrows, former Bishop of Buckingham, at All Saints Church, High Wycombe. Bishop Burrows had given Margaret much support and encouragement during her time working with the Church in Chesham, so it was particularly fitting that he should be able to both attend and officiate at her ordination.

THE SADDEST OF DAYS

It was a tremendous shock to us all when Margaret was diagnosed with terminal cancer in early February this year. She died, on February 27th, as she had lived - positive, sure of her Christian faith, encouraging her family and friends to make the very best of their lives and preaching the love of God and his compassion for we mere mortals.

A wonderful service of celebration of her life was held in Amersham Free Church on March 6th at which many spoke of her pioneering spirit in respect of women's ordination and her determination to grow the congregation at St. John's. Her work as vicar at St Johns here in Ashley Green was fruitful, bringing new people to the church and she visited with kindly consideration those who did not particularly want to come to church, but enjoyed Margaret's company.

After her retirement in 2000, she and her husband, Brian enjoyed travelling and visiting their three children and six grandchildren. She also assisted the clergy at St. Michael's, Amersham, from time to time.

She will be greatly missed by all who knew her.

Self-help Worldwide

Workaid is a local Christian-based Organisation started over Twenty Five years ago with the aim of tackling poverty abroad mostly in East Africa, in a practical way.

Each year volunteers collect around 70 tonnes of unwanted items - tools of **EVERY** type - from all over the UK and refurbish them at the Amersham workshops. Sewing Machines, Knitting Machines Carpentry tools Typewriters, tools for engineers, leatherworkers, plumbers - the list is endless.

Once cleaned and refurbished they are packed and then shipped to vocational training projects, where people are taught to use them in skilled trades such as tailoring, carpentry, cobbling and car mechanics. Successful trainees are helped to set up their own small businesses and thus these disadvantaged people are able to earn a living and build better lives for themselves and their families.

Since 1986, Workaid has sent more than 4,350 tool kits, 7,700 sewing machines, 900 knitting machines, 6,000 typewriters, and 200 duplicators to over 1,350 training projects and thus directly improving the lives of around 40,000 disabled and disadvantaged people in some of the world's poorest areas.

Workaid is a registered charity and relies entirely on funds donated by companies, charitable trusts and individuals.

News From St Johns

The most exciting news is that after an interregnum of two years the Parish of Great Chesham will have a Rector and Team Leader. The Revd. Simon Cansdale will be inducted in the Parish by the Bishop of Buckingham on Thursday 12th June. On Sunday, 29th June, he will be conducting our Service of Holy Communion at 9.30am. As he will, constitutionally, be the Vicar of St. John's, everyone will be especially welcome at this service to meet him.

Coffee/tea and croissants will be served from 8.30am on that morning, so you can meet him informally before the service.

Another piece of exciting news is that at long last we have managed to secure the approval of the Victorian Society, English Heritage and the Diocese for our plans to install a toilet, small kitchenette and separate meeting room at the west end of the Church. Detailed building plans are now being drawn and then quotations for the construction costs will be sought.

The plans are displayed inside the Church and so of course can be viewed on any Sunday when the Church is open from 9.00am until 11.00am or by request to a Churchwarden. It is our intention to open the Church on the afternoon of the Village Fair, Saturday 7th June, so please come in then to look at the plans or simply to enjoy the peace and glory of this "perfect example of the architect G.E. Street's work" as English Heritage describes St. John's.

The Ashley Green burial ground regulations

The following information is written to forestall any misunderstanding of the regulations governing the burial ground in Ashley Green, situated on the corner of the junction of Hog Lane and the main Chesham Road.

The burial ground is an extension to the churchyard that surrounds the Church of St. John the Evangelist which was built in 1873 on land that was gifted by Lord Chesham. In 1990 St. John the Evangelist became a district church within the Parish of Great Chesham in the Diocese of Oxford. The churchyard and burial ground fall into the category of an "open Anglican churchyard" and they are consecrated to their purpose in the name of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In order to protect this special status rules have to be laid down and observed.

Anyone who lives within the parish has the right to burial in this ground, but the burial must be conducted according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England.

Interment of the coffin, or cremated remains, in the burial ground, may be a right for all parishioners, but the erection of a memorial over a grave, though now customary, is not a privilege. Strictly speaking nothing may be introduced into a burial ground belonging to a church without the authority of the incumbent, who is the Rector of the Parish of Great Chesham.

The incumbent may normally grant permission for the erection of a simple memorial made of natural stone or hardwood, and is entitled to designate the place for the grave, unless a space has already been reserved, the depth of that grave and the material of the coffin to be buried.

Maintenance of graves and memorials is the responsibility of relatives of the deceased, but the maintenance and management of the grounds is the responsibility of the incumbent and the church council.

Further information can be found in a leaflet which is displayed in the porch of St .John's, or from the Churchwardens.



On the night of the 2nd February the Village Hall became the "White Lion Public House" where a dastardly murder was committed - with the aid of the Rickmansworth Players.

Our Police Community Support Officers

You will be aware that Police Community Support Officers (PCSO's) have been introduced as a level of additional support to the Police in the UK, but you may not know their role in the community or how to contact them, or even for what.

That is about to change since we now fall into an area called "Chesham Rural" and which has been assigned a neighbourhood team consisting of a Police Constable and Police Community Support Officers, so we welcome PC Melvin Mutch, and PCSO's Les Roche and Darren Scott.

Their "Patch" in "Chesham Rural" stretches from Pednor, and The Lee in the west, Buckland Common, Chartridge, Asheridge, and Bellingdon, in the north and then to Ashley Green, Ley Hill, and Latimer in the east and south.

So, what do they do?

In Lesley's own words:-

"We are uniformed, highly visible members of police staff, whose role is to build links in the community.

We have been tasked with identifying the issues for our areas and working with our partner agencies, such as schools, Parish and District Councils, Emergency Services, etc to address these.

We will be used to tackle problems with antisocial behaviour, and have powers to confiscate tobacco and alcohol, carry out road checks, and remove vehicles that are either obstructing or abandoned. We are able to assist in the investigation of crime, but do not get involved in the more high risk tasks that police officers perform, and so do not carry handcuffs, captor spray, or a baton.

Most PCSO's spend most of their time on foot patrol I however, am the exception to the rule, since the patch is so large it would take all day to walk to Ashley Green and back.

While I might see a couple of horses on the way. I put forward an idea that I become the very first mounted PCSO (being a horsey girl) but I do not think that Thames Valley Police are very keen on the idea, so you will probably see me in a proper police car so please feel free to flag me down for a chat.

I will be stopping to wander around in my high visibility jacket from time to time, so if you see me why not come and say "Hello".

PC Mutch, PCSO Scott and myself will be part of the neighbourhood action group (NAG) which is made up of parish district and county councillors and also members of the public, to tackle issues in the rural community.

It has been made clear from a public meeting at Bellingdon, that the priorities in the area are speeding, fly tipping and potholes, and we will be working with our partners to try and resolve these problems. Fly Tipping is one of my pet hates, and will anyone who sees it contact me, give me a precise location, and if you can, the vehicle registration of the culprit and I will do my best to get the rubbish removed quickly, and pass on the details for prosecution.

I personally, am keen to come along to your community groups and hope to arrange an evening out with Di Burnett with the youth club. Please contact me if you would like me to attend any of your clubs or events, and I will bring the crime prevention van with me, or failing that I will just come along to meet you.

I am also keen to start promoting "Farmwatch" and the "Horsewatch Scheme" in the area and am soon to be trained to mark tack.
